

FROM THE VICAR, REVD PAUL CAWTHORNE

What can one write a week after a terrorist attack which has resulted in personal tragedies and questioned the self-understanding of a neighbouring nation? To write of fundamental truths of human sinfulness and shattered ideals would be trite.

When working abroad, I saw the impacts of many kinds of extremism, such as the atheistic extremism in Pol Pot's genocidal regime in Cambodia. In France we now have the bitterness of the theistic fundamentalist variety, which it would be all too easy to see as being about 'them' attacking 'our' established liberties.

The truth is more complex, of course. Why, oh why can we not learn the lesson Jesus taught? 'Let him who is without sin cast the first stone.'

Why do people retreat into the damaging rigidity of ideology? Is it because society is changing too fast for some to bear and they want timeless certainties?

Here our understandings of what a person is are stretched, too long impoverished by losing the language to even discuss the perhaps admirable but failed pseudo-scientific project to banish the language of sin from our vocabulary and our experience.

I write that wistfully, as a spiritual seeker after a rejuvenated language where we dare to discuss such matters again at depth. Without it, I fear for our common future.

There is a temptation to retreat into a quietism which pretends it can stay calm by just not engaging. That is easier for us in rural Oxfordshire perhaps than the inhabitants of urban multi-cultural communities. But of course we know that our humanity is capable of more honourable responses. The vibrancy of the Cowley road shows us what can be added to our knowledge and life experience by mutual meeting, yet even that carries risk.

Mutuality is about more than stark cartoons which can demean unintentionally or provocatively. Mutual fear can lead to the ratcheting up of tensions which results in bombs and bullets flying in both directions, but mutual respect can lead to understanding our common bonds, to refinding the real charisms of love, forgiveness and valuing the stranger.

As we worked together in the sun to bring food to war-weary refugees, I learnt so much from my Muslim colleagues in Sudan, about prayer, true charity and respect. The pen is indeed a mighty symbol, but more so is the warm and open heart.

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CLIFTON HAMPDEN SURGERY PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP DECEMBER 2014 - JANUARY 2015 NEWS

The recent survey questionnaire was returned by over 10% of registered patients who gave a very positive response on the way in which the Practice operates and deals with patients.

Patients who wish to be registered as carers and qualify for a carer grant of up to £600 should apply to Carers Oxfordshire. Only three grants are currently available and details on how to apply are available at the Surgery.

The "Friends & Family" patient consultation system is in operation at the Surgery and reporting cards are available at Reception after all appointments. The on-line appointment and prescription renewal system is working well but appointments with a nurse still need to be made by telephone.

Following some further welcome donations, there is now a good prospect of the proposed defibrillator being installed outside the Surgery early in the New Year.

We hope that the Practice website will soon include useful information on where to go for treatment for minor ailments (e.g. local pharmacies), minor injuries (e.g. local hospitals) and other medical issues requiring specialist clinics, Any patients with medicines within their use by date can hand them in to the Surgery for recycling to third world countries where they are really needed.

All older patients need to remind themselves of the risks from influenza and arrange to have an immunisation jab if not already done.

The following is an account of the crash of F/O Gentile in Aircraft P-38,F5E-4LO,44-24284 on 8 January 1945.

AT 10.30 hours F/O Gentile was airborne from USAAF station 234 to fly a local flight. At 1100 hours the pilot called by radio that he was experiencing difficulty due to lack of manifold pressure and would some pilot give him some advice. After accepting advice F/O Gentile was still unable to correct his troubles and was told to bail out and abandon his aircraft. At 1109 the aircraft crashed approximately four miles north of the base.

BALDON TRAGEDY

THREE DEAD AFTER PLANE CRASH

"An American aircraft crashed on a house at Toot Baldon on Monday and two children lost their lives while their mother was severely burned. The pilot of the aircraft bailed out it is understood, but was killed. The children were Joy Marie Taylor, aged three months and her four year old brother, Colin Taylor.

Their parents Mr and Mrs John Waring Taylor live at the Old Farmhouse, Toot Baldon. The aircraft crashed into the house and burst into flames setting fire to the building. The cottage was severely damaged as a result. Three N.F.S. pumps and two mobile units turned out to deal with the blaze.

Mrs Taylor and her children were taken to the Radcliffe Infirmary where the younger child died on Monday. Colin succumbed to his injuries the following day.

Mrs Taylor's condition was at first regarded as serious, but on inquiry at the Radcliffe Infirmary yesterday (Thursday) it was stated that her condition was satisfactory."

Report of the Aircraft Accident Committee 5th February 1945

"The pilot was on a high altitude training flight. At 28,000 feet he reported having engine trouble .. he was advised to feather left engine. Pilot next reported both engines feathered, altitude 13,000 feet and being unable to start either engine. Pilot advised to bail out if aircraft was not under control by 3,000 feet. His last transmission stated he was at 2,600 feet." F/O Albert Gentile was killed as he bailed out. Investigators found his chute was unopened and concluded that he may have hit a part of the aircraft before he could pull the rip cord.

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parish Precept for 2015/6

At the November meeting of the Parish Council there was the annual discussion at this time of year on the budget requirements and the setting of the parish precept for the coming financial year, leading to the request we have to make to SODC each January.

In the past the council has only asked for increases every 4-5 years and has absorbed increases in expenditure and inflation until fairly substantial increase becomes an inevitable requirement. This year the council has resolved to move to recommending a small increase every year linked with inflation as a more efficient way of planning our expenditure and meeting new costs.

The council has therefore recommended a 4% increase in the precept for 2015/6. This equates with an annual increase overall for Marsh Baldon of £194 and £99 for Toot Baldon to be shared by the number of houses in each of the villages.

Parish Council Elections May 7th

Alongside the General election on May 7th there will be the SODC election of District Councillors and the Parish Council election for your councillors for Toot Baldon Parish and Marsh Baldon Parish. Marsh has four council seats and Toot two seats with separate elections taking place for each parish.

SODC will be publicising the election and seeking applications for those interested in standing for election during March and April. If you are interested in standing and want more information on what is involved speak to any Parish Councillor.

This election is very important for the village. The Parish Council is the first level of democracy where your elected representatives represent the interests of the community on a wide variety of issues to SODC and OCC and other bodies, whether on strategic policy, local planning and related issues as well as managing a local budget (the precept) and dealing with a range of local practical village matters.

Planning applications

The Baldons and Nuneham Community Society have submitted a new planning application for the Seven Stars which is for the building of a much needed new toilet block off the main bar area. Plans can be seen on the SODC web site planning ref P14/S3709/Ful. The Parish Council supported the application which SODC has also now approved.

The Dairy, Manor Farm Barns, Toot Baldon. A new application is being considered by the council for the erection of a garden shed. Planning ref P14/S4081.

Provision of an Emergency Defibrillator

Many villages in Oxfordshire and elsewhere are being encouraged to have a defibrillator available 24/7 to accelerate the rapid response needed when emergencies arise and ambulances take time to get here.

Sara McDouall (our medical expert) has briefed the Parish Council on the importance of this bit of kit and its life saving potential, and councillors have given their support to her

proposal that we explore all the practical issues and how best to move forward, the likely costs and sources of funding. The use of the old telephone box on the green in Marsh Baldon would be an appropriate location to house one if it is upgraded and the phone line disconnected as BT have previously indicated the box and service are redundant.

Sara has provided more info, see her article elsewhere in the newsletter, and has asked for feedback on your support or otherwise for this proposal, which we will need, if we are to find ways of securing the finance and going ahead. There will be more information available in future newsletters.

Village clear up Sunday 12th April

As usual we intend to hold a village clear up day on Sunday 12th April please put the date in your diary and come and help. It is a week or two later than usual.

There is always a lot of rubbish to pick up from roadside verges ditches and round the green and the more people who help the quicker we are done. Meet on the Green at 10 30am or liaise with John Maskell for collecting in Toot Baldon. There will be pick-up sticks, waste bags etc. supplied by SODC but please bring strong shoes / wellies and gloves. Meet in the pub afterwards for a refreshing drink.

In the event of really bad weather and we may have to postpone to the following Sunday. A reminder will be in the March Newsletter.

Flooding problems Baldon lane

During November Thames water installed a new pump and equipment in the pumping station on Baldon Lane and has now informed the council that the work they promised to resolve periodic failure of the pumps has now been completed. Councillors will be monitoring the situation during the winter months and if problems and associated flooding continues to occur will take this up again with Thames Water.

Trees on the Green

A few of the Chestnuts on the west side of the green are showing signs of disease and are dying back. The Parish Council have agreed with the agent for Queen's College that two of the trees can be removed and the Parish Council has agreed to plant two Pin oak trees as replacements, similar to the one we planted for the Jubilee. We hope to do this this winter subject also to SODC tree officer approval.

These Chestnuts were originally bought for the village by Mr Charles Priestley, the previous owner of Baldon House. If any villager would also like to sponsor one of these replacement trees please let Laurence Attewill know tel 343336.

It is likely that more of these Chestnuts will be affected by disease in the coming years and the council will be discussing with Queen's College plans for their gradual replacement.

Dog Waste Bin Toot Baldon

The new waste bin for dog poo should have been installed by the end of January at the top of The Avenue just beyond the Parish Council and Church notice boards. If you walk your dog nearby please use it.

Faster Broadband

The first indication that faster broadband is on its way was seen just before Christmas when engineers were working near the Seven Stars getting the ground ready for installing new cables.

DEFIBRILLATOR PROPOSAL

There is a proposal to install an automatic defibrillator into the now rarely used telephone box on the side of Marsh Baldon green.



This would require a removal of the telephone line and some refurbishment of the telephone box. There would be a fundraising initiative associated with this proposal. If the scheme were to be followed through the installation of the defibrillator would be accompanied by training opportunities for anyone in the villages both in its use and performance of cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

NUNEHAM COURTENAY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Since the last newsletter there have been two meetings of the Parish Council and some significant changes.

At the meeting on the 8 December 2014 the Parish Council:

- signed the clerk's contract of employment, with an official start date of 1st September 2014,
- reviewed the comments made by the external auditors on the Annual Return, which was received in October,
- reviewed the potential financial out-turn for 2014/15 and identified additional areas of support for various local initiatives including the Good Neighbour Scheme and Adult Luncheon Club,
- approved the Precept for 2015/16 which was set at £4,500 (with no increase on the current base charge per Band D property).

At the open section of the meeting a parishioner raised concerns at openness and transparency of Parish Council business and it was noted that there were issues of non-compliance with relevant legislation in holding meetings to discuss Parish Business.

Councillor George has therefore resigned as Chair, remaining on the Council to ensure some continuity ahead of planned retirement from the Council prior to the next election. Councillors Deakin and Casey also resigned from the Council.

This left the Council inquorate so SODC appointed District Councillor Elizabeth Gillespie so that the Parish Council could co-opt new members at an Extraordinary General Meeting, which was held on 14 January 2015.

At that meeting Councillor Love was appointed as Chair and the following councillors were co-opted:

- Mark Pritchett
- Olive Garfoot
- Peter Brooks

Cllr Gillespie then stood down.

I have every confidence that, with John Cotton at the helm of a very able team, what could have been a disaster will, in the long run, prove to have been merely a substantial inconvenience. I would ask everyone to be understanding and patient, but please do not hesitate to contact me personally should there be any pressing issues of concern.

On other matters, we are in the advanced process of working on the coming budget and I am confident that it is going to be business as usual. Donning my portfolio hat, I can report that we are also looking at making modifications to our Grants policy and I will update you on this in the next newsletter.

Transport Improvement Works

Ahead of Christmas work was completed on the £7m A423 Southern Bypass Scheme at Hinksey and Kennington Roundabouts. Work on a series of multi-million pound transport improvement projects is to start in January 2015. Schemes on London Road, the Plain in Oxford City and Milton Interchange will all get under way, marking the latest phase of investment in the county's transport infrastructure and future economic success.

The work is designed to be phased but some of the funds are dependent on spending within a certain time frame. If a project were to be deferred, it would mean some residents would not benefit from improvements. It was welcome news that we were given 6 year road maintenance funding as it will enable us to plan over a longer period with certainty of funds. Please information on future schemes:

Oxfordshire Leads The Way For Recycling

Oxfordshire County Council has maintained its position as one of the best counties for recycling of waste in the country, coming top in 3 of the 7 categories. Figures compiled by the Department for Environment, Energy and Rural Affairs (Defra) show that Oxfordshire had the lowest amount of residual waste per household in the country. The county was also top of the tables for recycling & composting percentage and dry recycling percentage and was the best performing county council for household waste per head. We are committed to keeping a network of major roads free from ice to minimise the risk of accidents and ensure the smooth flow of traffic. Precautionary salting (sometimes called 'gritting') helps achieve this aim. Gritting teams have already been out in November due to falls in overnight temperatures. The County Council's website displays a considerable amount of information including up to date information on road surface temperatures that indicate when and where gritting will take place. It also shows the roads that are routinely salted during the winter. The page also links to general advice on dealing with snow and ice, and school closures. Daily updates on the roads are also sent out via twitter for those following @oxfordshirecc.

FROM JOHN HOWELL MP

I am writing this month when we have just witnessed one of the worst attacks of arson known in the area. The fire at the district council offices, the funeral directors, and the cottage in Roke Marsh left significant problems, enormous concern and much uncertainty. I am grateful to all those who have worked so hard to get the district council services up and running so quickly following the event. I know that the midnight oil was burning and weekends given up to help. I would also like to record my thanks to the fire service and police for the excellent work they did on these incidents.

Arson attacks are thankfully rare events. More generally there is good news that the level of crime has reduced across the county. However I was particularly delighted to see figures recently published that showed that in the four year period from June 2010 to June 2014 there has been a 30% decrease in recorded crime in the Thames Valley Policing area. I was pleased to have the opportunity to put this on record in the House and to seek the Minister's congratulations for our police force on their work to keep us safe.

The state of our roads is an issue regularly raised with me. Maintenance and repairs are a responsibility of the county council and I welcomed the announcement of nearly £17 million of new funding for Oxfordshire for road maintenance. This is part of £87,143,000 of funding allocated for roads maintenance in Oxfordshire up to 2020/21 – the first time councils have had certainty over funding for this length of time. This will mean they can plan ahead and spend more efficiently and effectively. It is much needed money to tackle potholes and improve our roads.

I have been advised that a campaign organisation has categorically stated that Henley is sitting on a seam of shale gas. This strikes me as extremely doubtful and I have asked both for information about this and proof that it is not so.

With several months until the election and plenty of work to do it is frustrating that things already seem to be focusing on campaign issues. Let me reassure readers that my office is keeping focus on the work that needs to be done and will continue to help with issues where we are able as usual. My contact details are below. RAY NICHOLS

Ray Nichols was Vicar of Dorchester from 1974 to 1987. His funeral took place in the Abbey on December 22nd and addresses were given by his son Paul and colleague Reverend David Barton. Excerpts from these addresses are included below, but Sue Booys would be happy to provide full copies of each address on request.

Ray Nichols was a man of many contrasts and surprises. At school, sport was the only thing that really mattered to him at school and he was let off beatings if he had played well the day before! Yet, in spite of only a brief formal education, I think he was one of the most well-read people I have ever met and could always offer profound and thought-provoking advice on pretty much any subject, or provide startling insight into complex theological issues.

During the war the Merchant Navy took him everywhere, from the North Atlantic to Australia and Argentina, while later years saw him promoting Christian knowledge all over the world.

During his seafaring days Ray's life centred around duty free whisky, meeting friends in London's jazz clubs and rubbing shoulders with the likes of Stephane Grappelli and George Shearing. Maybe that's where his love of music was ignited. Then, one night in 1946 his life changed for ever. In that year [his brother] Percy had taken Ray to hear some of the best and most powerful preachers in London. And Ray had always scurried off afterwards, avoiding a conversation. But one evening, at a family event, they found themselves sharing a room together, and scurrying off was out of the question. "Isn't it about time?" Percy asked. And Ray discovered it was. The claims of Christ upon him were unavoidable.

He threw himself into youth missions before formally training for the priesthood that would become his life's work. That change owed itself to his brother, and family was, throughout Ray's life, the place where most he felt comfortable and the place where, for him, prayer was best prayed. To the end it was prayer with Barbara that sustained him. And that sense of family and faith all bound together clearly imprinted itself strongly on each of their four children.

At his peak, Ray scaled the heights of 5'3". As we reflect on his life it's obvious that this was a big man in a small package. For a small man, he leaves a big hole. Now there was a man.

Revd Dr Michael Lakey: Understanding St Paul and his Epistles

The writings of St Paul have been immensely significant for the theology and practice of the Church for most of its history. From St Augustine reading Romans, to Luther reading Galatians, and beyond, St Paul can be found, just below the surface, in nearly all Western Christianity. However, though he is everywhere, St Paul is sometimes not read as much as he could be. Partly this is because we favour the Gospel readings, but can also be because St Paul's writings contain much that is difficult (whether for ancient or modern readers).

These five short Lent talks in Dorchester Abbey on Sunday evenings (35 minutes + questions and discussion) aim to offer an introduction to some of the issues and ideas that might help us to understand and appreciate St Paul better. When and where did he write? How ought we to think about his transformation from persecutor to apostle? Why did he write the way he did? What were his views about God, the World, salvation, men and women? You do not need to be a specialist! They will be followed by a short act of compline-style worship (apart from 22nd February and 15th March).
