BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Toot Baldon Sewage Project

Background

Following a section 101a application from the Parish Council/Residents Sub-Committee an assessment report was completed in 2016. This confirmed the case for first time sewage and a valid S101a application, as there is clear evidence of significant environmental and amenity issues in the village.

Project Objectives

The objective of the scheme is to provide a new sewer system to allow properties to connect to a mains sewer if they so wished.

An outline solution has now been prepared in a further study report in 2019: Gravity sewers draining to a pumping station in the south of the village will be pumped into the sewers for the north of the village. A pumping station will be provided in the north of the village with the rising main discharging to a manhole and sewer draining from Garsington to Sandford Sewage Treatment Works.

At the appropriate time Thames Water will also supply an information pack for each property to enable connection to the new sewer, including a plan of the connection point.

Property Connection Process

Once completed, the project will leave a connection point to each property. If a customer decides they want to be connected, they would then be required to contact Thames Water (TW), fill in an application form and pay a connection fee of circa £300. N.B this is only a connection fee – see below for full connecting charges.

At such a point, customers will have the opportunity to ask TW for a quotation to construct a connection between the customer's septic tanks into the new mains sewer, and/or get a quotation from their own contractor to obtain a comparison quote, before making any final decision.

When asked about these costs TW were understandably reluctant to commit themselves at this point, as it is very difficult to gauge as it will depend on many individual factors e.g., how far away the property is from the new mains connection point etc. however, they did say the average costs today are in the region of £1200 to £1500.

N.B Wilmots' private sewer connection is being dealt with by SODC.

Present Project Activity (TW employees will be seen around the village).

- Site visits data collection
- Agreeing pumping station layouts and prepare drawings for planning purposes.

- Complete site investigations: geotechnical ground investigations, environmental surveys.
- Liaise with landowners.

Customer Communication (when appropriate)

Provide updates on the application and progress of planned work. In the main this will be done via the Parish Council/ Residents Sub Committee.

Letters, customer meetings and drop-in sessions will also be arranged.

Summary

Finally, after many years and many false dawns TW appear to be fully committed to installing a main sewage system into the village. Over this time there have been many meetings and several different proposals, however, in our opinion this is the best to date, especially as it does not rely on the take up of numbers, covers all properties in the village and will in the end give residents a choice.

Solar Farm

The council still has no news from SODC regarding the planning decision.

Dog Waste Bins

The council has been forced to take on a new contractor for emptying the waste bins, this has resulted in a cost to the council of £16.00 pw. An increase of £7.00 pw but this remains cheaper than with SODC (Biffa).

It is important the waste bins are used and there is also a new larger general waste bin outside the Seven Stars which can be used for dog waste, so if you are a dogwalker please use them. We still get occasional complaints of dog waste being left on the green and on footpaths.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

National information is starting to be published about events to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee over the weekend of 3rd June 2022. Assuming covid and nothing else untoward intervenes, plans appear to include various events in London and on the Sunday the organisation of village parties. Also, the Prince of Wales is supporting a tree planting in association with the Woodland Trust.

No doubt the Baldons will want to celebrate as we have done on other notable occasions and more discussion and planning can take place in the autumn, but we

are, as on other occasions, going to need a group of villagers willing to volunteer as the organising and fund-raising committee.



BALDONS CRICKET CLUB:

Oxford Downs CC lost to Islip by ~30 runs Reported by Henry Williams

As captain Cosmo tucked into another beautifully crafted quattro formaggi drenched in Italian sun, stand-ins Johnny Collett and Henry Williams welcomed a youthful Islip team to a sunny Marsh Baldon green.



After losing the toss, Baldons began their bowling stint admirably. Collett bowled with his usual accuracy and Rob Cook found a devilish bounce off a length that produced two wickets in his opening spell, including a diving catch at short third man by Williams. Despite this confidence boost, Williams bowling first change couldn't find his length or apparently his run up with a number of no-balls. After finally asking the Islip umpire for some guidance on the mis-step, it came to light that there was a minor misunderstanding on the implementation of this particular cricketing law. Islip, you slip, he/she/it slips.

Meanwhile, on the calmer end of the wicket, Toby Cook bowled a wonderful 6 over spell picking up a number of wickets. BCC may have a real prospect on their hands here. Indeed, youth seemed to excel in all areas, as Kian Downes bowled an excellent 3 over spell from the other end with a devastatingly low Malinga-like action. The innings was rounded out with some good accuracy from Joe Singleton and Cook, Collett, Williams finishing off their quotas. A mention should go to Stephen Fearnley rolling back the years with some great fielding at point, Robin Timms for a brilliant and exhausting stint at wicketkeeper after cycling halfway across Britain, and to Archie Platt for his wonder catch running in at deep square leg.

Islip had posted 149 runs leaving a lovely round chase of 150. The feeling was that it was maybe 20-30 runs over par for the wicket with harsh umpiring leading to extras close to top scoring. Nevertheless, Charles Taylor and Graham Bruce strode to the crease with the target in their sights. Unfortunately, it then came to light that Islip had leant on the club at Kidlington to supplement their bowling stock, with one kid in particular firing down some accurate thunderbolts. Having seen the openers off, Charles proceeded to be barraged by a series of beamers at first change; indeed one of which he had the misfortune of pulling up into his unhelmeted face. A brief moment of real scare from all was greeted with relief and a generous applause, as Charles walked off the pitch of his own accord, with his usual warm smile and humorous observations lifting the tension. The run rate crept into an unmanageable territory and with Rob back in the pavilion, the game got away from us. There was just enough time for Johnny Collett to come in and strike some late boundaries leading many to question his own decision to bat down at 9. With 30 or so runs required and the final ball about to be delivered, Johnny brought laughs to all involved quipping "How many do we need off this?"

NUNEHAM COURTENAY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Deep Cleanse

South Oxfordshire's contractors will be coming to the parish towards the end of August to carry out what SODC calls a deep cleanse. The team will be litter picking, sweeping and removing weeds/moss on pavements. But the team will not spray weeds, cut grass or vegetation or remove weeds and moss that is on roads. The team only clears land to which the public is permitted access.

In this parish there are only really two stretches of pavement – on either side of the main road – so the Council usually asks them to deal with those. If you can think of anything else that might fit SODC's rules, please let me know.

County Council

Your new County Councillor, Robin Bennett from the Green Party, has produced his first monthly report, which you can find on the Council's website. He explains there that the County Council is now led by a three-party coalition and the Conservatives are now the Opposition, a role they have never experienced before on the County Council.

The County Council's new Leader is a Liberal Democrat, Liz Leffman from Charlbury. Robin's report gives you in full the 10 shared aims of the coalition between the Liberal Democrats and the Greens (who have formed a single group together on the Council) and their Labour partners.

Your MP

The Boundary Commission for England has published proposals for changes to parliamentary constituencies in 2023. It proposes Oxfordshire should have seven MPs instead of the current six, and it proposes to move Nuneham Courtenay from the Henley constituency to what would be called the Didcot and Wantage constituency (currently known as Wantage).

You have until 2nd August to comment on these proposals but there will be two further rounds of consultation before the final proposals are made. Both Henley and Wantage currently have Conservative MPs: your current MP is John Howell; the current Wantage MP is David Johnston.

Next Council meeting

The Council's first physical meeting since February 2020 will be held on Monday 21st June at 7pm in the Village Hall. The Government has insisted that all town and parish councils must hold a physical meeting before 30th June to complete their annual audit process – in spite of the continued Covid-19 restrictions.

Once the Council has approved the auditor's report, there is something called the Period for the Exercise of Public Rights, which lasts 30 working days, in which you can demand to see the Council's books for 2020-21. But you already have so many

rights under the Freedom of Information legislation there is no need to wait until then: if there is anything you want to know about where your money goes, just ask me!
