FROM REVEREND TERESA STEWART-SYKES

One of the great things about having a dog is that you have to go out for a walk every day; and every day you get to meet interesting people, who often stop and talk to you because you have a dog!

This morning I met John, also out for an early morning walk at Toot Church. We had a lovely conversation about the spirituality of being out in nature and John reminded me that people of all faiths, and none, find solace and wonder in the world's natural beauty. That's why we all love David Attenborough's programmes on TV!

I have also been reminded recently, when working with the wonderful BIVC (Berinsfield Information and Volunteer Centre) and the Abbeywoods Academy to find support for a family in need, that people can be such a joy to us too.

The Rev Sorrel has also been reflecting on the hope and solace we find in nature and in the people around us and she encourages us to find something each day, however small, that brings us joy. This is what she has written:

Every day at the moment, my husband and I walk our little dog and I notice the snowdrops and the crocuses emerging from the very soggy soil. Some days, illuminated by gentle winter sunlight but more often than not, they seem to be drowned in an awful lot of rain!

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Planning applications

6 The Green: P21/S 2027/HH & P21/S2028/LB

An application for the replacement of the existing garages with a single garage plus office, utility room, storage space and studio/ gym. The parish council has objected to the application as being too large and of inappropriate design for the location, and not compliant with the Baldons Neighbourhood Plan policies.

Flooding

Again, this winter we have been deluged with rain and fields and footpaths are awash with flooded areas and very muddy. There is also an increasing problem of floodwater on roads due to overflowing ditches and blocked culverts and gullies which have created conditions that could be dangerous to cars and pedestrians in freezing weather.

With global warming this is going to be an increasing problem for us and as a village we must start to look at ways we can help to mitigate problems. The Highways department are principally responsible for dealing with flooding on roads by clearing drains and gullies and under road culverts but due to resource constraints are not doing so as regularly as they used to.

However, most of the road flooding problems stem from the lack of maintenance and clearance of ditches by landowners and tenants. Landowners tenants and householders who have a ditch on or outside their land have a Riparian responsibility to ensure that water flows freely down the watercourses. Some ditches are cleared irregularly others have become very overgrown and almost disappeared or become blocked by fly tipping.

The Parish Council is doing what it can to encourage landowners etc. to do more and cooperate where necessary to resolve problems. We have pressed the Highways department to resolve the problems in Toot Baldon where blocked drains and a culvert under the road are the problem.

But we also need help from villagers

If you have a ditch however small outside your property, please keep it clear and work with your neighbours to ensure the water flows.

The parish council only maintains ditches across the main body of the village green. If there are drains near your property you can help by keeping the top of the drain cover free of leaves and grass mowings which are often the cause of blockages in the pipes. If there is fly tipping in ditches it needs reporting to SODC / Biffa for clearing.

Bioabundance

Villagers will have seen and read the document from a new voluntary community interest company and campaigning group, Bioabundance which was circulated in

January via the village email. They are seeking contributions to its campaign to challenge the SODC Local Plan in the courts and to promote greater protection for the countryside and environment from excessive and inappropriate development. There has recently been more publicity in the local media of the work of the group and information about the group can be seen on their website www.bioabundance.org

The Parish Council will be discussing its support or otherwise for the work of this organization at the March meeting. If you have already indicated your support for the group directly please let your local councillors know as it will help to inform our discussion.

Annual Parishes meeting: Monday 19th April 2021 7.30pm

The Annual parishes meeting of the parishes of Marsh Baldon and Toot Baldon in April last year was cancelled due to the COVID-19 lockdown.

This year the Parish Council will be holding it on April 19th most likely by Zoom unless restrictions are eased to allow a meeting in the village hall. As usual this is your meeting to raise issues with the council and if you wish to raise something in advance please inform our clerk Tom James, **no later than 12th April.**

The council also as usual is required to present its annual report and accounts at the meeting. More information and the agenda etc. will be circulated by village email.

Date of next Parish Council meeting is May 10th: more information in the April newsletter.

Village Library



Winter Support Grants available to help people hit financially by pandemic

Oxfordshire County Council, in partnership with the county's district councils and Citizens Advice services, is **offering support to vulnerable residents** through a Winter Support Grant. Oxfordshire was awarded £400,000 by the government in December to fund the cost of **food**, **electricity**, **heating** and other essential items, and the financial help is available for households to claim by **31 March**, **2021**.

Households with children can claim up to £350, while those without children can receive up to £175. The support teams provide the funding through supermarket vouchers, cover costs for pre-payment meters, or make sure that a heating or water bill is paid. If a resident has received a food voucher from a previous scheme, they may also be eligible to have one from the Winter Support Grant.

OXFORDSHIRE

Trees you can plant this winter to help pollinators:-

- Male grey willow (sallow): Salix cinerea
- Goat willow: Salix caprea
- Small-leaved lime: Tilia cordata
- Service trees: Sorbus torminalis, Sorbus domestica
- Apple: Malus (any species), fruit bearing, or ornamental
- Cherry Plum: Prunus cerasifera
- Wild Hawthorn: Crataegus monogyna/laevigata

Gardening tips

- Leave the dead plant stems over winter. Hollow stems may be used by bees for over wintering.
- Provide flowers throughout the year some bees emerge as early as February.
- Buy organic to ensure bulbs and plants haven't been treated with neonicotinoids.
- Have a flowering lawn.
- Provide a source of water for bees.
- Leave a patch of bare earth mason bees gather mud to build egg cells.
- Include a variety flower shapes different species have different tongue lengths.

Would you like to help protect and improve local footpaths?

Then why not become a Parish Path Warden?

Since 2012 Oxfordshire Area Ramblers, the Oxford Fieldpaths Society and Oxfordshire County Council's Countryside Access Service have been working together to develop a network of volunteer Parish Path Wardens (PPWs) throughout the County.

Neither Nuneham Courtenay nor The Baldons parishes currently have a recognised PPW and we would like to change that – might you be one of the people we're looking for?

There are 4 main aspects to the role.

The main and by far the most important task of a PPW is to walk the paths in their parish twice a year or more, equipped with secateurs to do any trimming away of vegetation that may be overhanging or protruding onto the path, usually at a stile, gate or bridge.

The second task is if, while walking the paths, the PPW spots a <u>serious</u> problem (usually quite rare), for example a bridge where some of the rails are wobbly/dangerous, this is reported as soon as possible to the County Council's Field Officer (with photos if possible)

The third task is to send any <u>new</u> less-serious reports to the County Council using their on-line CAMSweb reporting system (we will provide training in how to do this)

Finally, twice a year the PPW receives information on all the unresolved problems that have been reported in their parish and is asked to update that list to show where a problem has been sorted - for example the farmer may have repaired an unsafe stile – and in that way acting as the 'eyes' of the County Council's Field Officer.

We will provide comprehensive guidance notes for PPW work as well as large scale maps of the parish which shows all the Public Rights of Way in detail.
