FROM REVEREND TERESA STEWART-SYKES

Such a contrast to the violence and heartbreak in Ukraine and the images of once thriving European cities obliterated into a uniform grey mess. What sense can we make of this? My colleague Jennifer Morton has been reflecting on this:

The first of May is exactly halfway between the Spring Equinox and the Summer Solstice and as the first day of summer its celebrations welcome the season for growth and fertility with many traditions across the world. It seems the month of May was always a time for festivals and in some places there is still maypole dancing, Morris Dancers, and the crowning of a May Queen. Locally of course in Oxford the choir of Magdalen College sing from the top of the tower to welcome May morning.

In 1889 1st May was chosen as International Workers Day to commemorate the struggle by workers for an eight-hour working day. It seems ironic that this has developed into the current May Day parades that show off military might and the means of destruction rather than improved working conditions. What a contrast!

In the Church May is a season of transition and transformation; it is during May that we keep Rogation, praying for the protection of growing crops and you may remember the tradition of beating the parish bounds to make sure everyone knew where the boundaries were! It is also during this season that the Church celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit to transform our lives and to guide us into a new way of living the rule of Love which Jesus proclaimed.

This is a path that surely does not include an endless show of military might not only on parade but also used against neighbour. Let us, therefore, continue to pray, not only for protection of our crops and communities, but also for peace with justice for all.

I join my thoughts and prayers with Jennifer and wish you a blessed and peaceful month of May

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Annual Parishes Meeting Monday 5th April

This is an important meeting for villagers to be able to ask questions and be updated on issues in the village but unfortunately only 4 were able to attend this year which is disappointing. The Parish Council Annual report and finance report were presented together with a report from the Fuel Charity.

The agenda had indicated that Beccy Harris headteacher would attend but she was unfortunately unable to attend at the last minute. Tom James as chairman of the governors reported instead on the success of the school which is oversubscribed for the September term and the increasing need for additional classroom accommodation.

Charles Campion from Savills land agent for the Queen's College also attended. Although invited earlier his attendance wasn't able to be listed on the agenda issued prior to the meeting as he hadn't confirmed his attendance but was added on the later version circulated on village email. It had also been mentioned in last month's newsletter. Mr. Campion spoke of the role of the land agents in managing the college estate which is a charity and also spoke of the ideas for development which they are considering for the Manor Farm barn site in Toot Baldon, the site being in the neighborhood development plan. It is intended that there will be a site plan for discussion with the council later this year when plans are firmer but more barn conversions and some retirement housing are under consideration. Mr. Campion was also asked to reconsider the lack of a water supply to the allotments.

All papers from the meeting are on the website including reports from our District and County councillors.

20 mph Speed limit

We have now had an encouraging response from the Highways department, that they are considering our application which we were told is 'pushing at an open door'. We await their decision and will keep you informed.

Annual Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2021

There were two Ordinary meetings of the Trustees in 21, supplemented by telephone and email communications between the Chair, Clerk and the other Trustees.

The main business remains the settling of fuel allowances for needy parishioners and granting of special payments for hardship cases or for educational purposes. Income for the year, almost exclusively investment income, totalled £16,953 (2020 £15,373.) and expenditure £15,339 (2020 £13,575), leaving a surplus for the year of £1,614 (2020 £1,799).


Payments were made to a total of 25 parishioners re' 'Cash in Lieu of Fuel' payment and three other parishioners for Education related purposes. Cost of Personal Alarms was £1,239, covering 7 individuals. Payments under the heading 'Special Grants' totalled £10,745.

There were no changes to the investment portfolio in the year. The market value of investments had increased by £137,597 compared with the previous year, leaving net assets of the Charity, at 31st December 2021, of £745,835 (2020 - £608,238).

NUNEHAM COURTENAY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Public Transport meeting

It was very good to see eight parishioners and one person from Marsh Baldon turn up at the Parish Meeting on 29th March to talk to Dave Harrison, Principal Public Transport Planner at Oxfordshire County Council, following the changes to the buses that happened in January. Considering the number of complaints you hear from other parish councils, it was surprising to hear Dave Harrison say it was only the second parish meeting he had been asked to attend.

It turned out some of the changes are only temporary, like the ones to the Thames Travel 45 service and the reduction in the number of buses between the village and Oxford City Centre. And the reason? Severe shortage of bus drivers, he told us. Came as a complete surprise to me. So the companies cannot run all the services they are supposed to do. And it seems Thames Travel pays less than other companies so it has worse problems, which is why the drivers now operating the X39 and X40 services are borrowed from Oxford Bus Company. Some parishioners felt there was a real and unwelcome difference in the way drivers now treat passengers.

So, Dave Harrison said the 45 bus might be back to normal by September but the service to Oxford raised other problems. The reason the company has diverted the buses down the Iffley Road is to make up for Stagecoach ceasing its service between the City Centre and Rose Hill: the X39 and X40 are being diverted so the service on the Iffley Road remains at eight buses per hour. And the company won't budge.

But Dave Harrison admitted that the X38, which has also been suspended due to the shortage of drivers, is an hourly bus paid for by the County Council out of contributions from developments in places like Benson so, when it comes back, the County Council can insist that it runs down the Abingdon Road, which is a much quicker way into Oxford from the village. All of this offered a little reassurance and hope to some parishioners and we all certainly found out a lot about the companies that run most of Oxfordshire's buses, what matters to them and, unfortunately, what doesn't.

Development?

The Council has been approached by a potential developer interested in buying less than one acre of land on the eastern side of the main road that is on sale for £ $\frac{1}{4}$ m from NJ Commercial of Stokenchurch. The estate agent does not claim anyone would be allowed to build new homes on the land but that is what most potential purchasers would hope to do.

Would South Oxfordshire allow them to do it? Surely not, but who can tell what the Planning Department might say?

Council's Annual Meeting

The Council's next planned meeting on Tuesday 3rd May is the Council's annual meeting where it elects a Chair and Vice-Chair for the following twelve months and re-adopts or amends its main policies and procedures. Let's face it: if I were ever to try to persuade you that Council meetings are fun to attend, I would not choose an annual meeting as there is a lot of routine business to get through, but it has to happen sometime.

Christmas trees

What Christmas trees, you may ask? I went to park in the Village Hall car park in broad daylight now the days are longer and what did I see: three Christmas trees lying on the grass turning brown. So, it means the District Council's contractors, Biffa, have failed to pick them up, again – you just may remember it has happened before. So, I think it's the third year in a row that the trees have stayed there until April. Thank goodness, they probably weren't in anyone's way.

Vacancy

Just to remind you, there is a vacancy on the Council. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please let me know or speak to one of the four existing councillors.

NUNEHAM COURTENAY SPORTS AND PLAYING FIELD ASSOCIATION (NCSPFA) UPDATE

We are trying to progress towards a safe and fit for purpose space for children to utilise. We understand the frustrations whilst the area remains closed for health and safety reasons.

Maintenance is required to remove an existing barbed wire fence and replace with a more child friendly option. In addition, plans are in place for some much-needed tree surgery. The Arboretum have voluntarily said they will do the necessary work, but are seeking planning permission from SODC before this can proceed. This is because we are in a conversation area.

We have obtained quotes to hire a roller to flatten the field and erect a new bench

The Association has no working capital to pay for this work upfront so we have applied for a grant to cover costs. Any ideas for fund raising would be welcome.

Please be patient as we aim to have the playing field open after work has been completed.
