

FROM REVD DAVID HAYLETT

I was intrigued to read in Church Times back in July a comment by the Revd Dr Alistair McGrath:

"My personal spiritual life is focused more on home and the parishes in which I minister and preach on Sundays, in a rural benefice on the western borders of Oxford Diocese. Leading worship in a 900 year old Cotswold churches gives you a strong sense of tradition of faith – and an unsettling sense of responsibility for ensuring this continues in the future." (Revd Dr Alistair McGrath is a former Principal of Wycliffe Hall, a Professor of Science and Religion at Oxford University and has written and lectured refuting the ideas of atheist Richard Dawkins.)

My interest was aroused because I often express a similar thought when I am welcoming congregations at "occasional offices" in Long Wittenham. Standing beneath a chancel arch which has stood there for some 900 years sends a tingle down my spine and invokes a sense of continuity, history and tradition, I am a priest in a long line of priests who has stood on this spot and led worship and officiated at major events in people's lives for nine centuries (longer if you count the Saxon church that was there before).

In our Team Ministry we are blessed (although at times we may feel burdened) with many historic churches which have witnessed to the glory of God for many centuries. We have inherited a tradition of faith and we are charged with a continuation into the future.

The question arises how do we ensure that continuation? A few weeks ago I was invited to celebrate at Stadhampton when Caroline was on holiday. I have been to Stadhampton several times since it was converted into a dual purpose Church/Village Hall, but this was my first time leading worship since the conversion. I was delighted to hear how this conversion has brought new life to Stadhampton with the emergence of several new ventures and opportunities to build Village life.

With Dorchester Abbey we have a space where it is possible to introduce some flexibility for concerts, exhibitions and various events. In the "patch" I am most familiar with, the Bridge Group, at Long Wittenham a restoration some years ago revealed that the wooden floor of the North Aisle stood directly on the earth and was dangerously rotten. So we replaced it with a concrete floor (a condition of the Faculty being that we used a specially formulated concrete so that if necessary it could be easily removed for archaeological investigation). This meant that the pews became moveable which created a more useable space.

As I look around other Church buildings I see many that are hampered with fixed furniture, usually Victorian pews which are rarely of any historic or artistic value (I suspect the Victorian Society, if it reads that, will add me to the list "iconoclasts") but for the majority of church buildings dating back to the Middle Ages, fixed pews are a recent addition, they are not sacrosanct. When I want to include young

people in my "sermon" to encourage, involve and teach them, I need space to do it and in some of our churches that space does not exist.

So let us take a long hard look at our Churches, are they suitable for worship? Are they useable during the week for, possibly secular activities, which brings people across the threshold and into a space where they feel welcome and comfortable? Would that further the mission of the Church? I believe so.

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Road Closure Notice

Between Monday November 13th and Friday 17th there will be a road closure in the villages from the A4074 junction along Baldon Lane and the Croft to approx. the junction with Baldon Row, Toot Baldon to allow contactors to install new cables for BT.

Diversions will be in place via the B480 and B4015

The closure notices will be in place at either end but work will be in short stretches starting from the A4074 Baldon Lane end, therefore varying parts of the road will remain accessible and residents with a frontage to the work will be accommodated. Contactors will make every effort to maintain access for business vehicles and to and from the school.

Planning applications

<u>Mallams</u>,Toot Baldon P17/S3077/FUL: The parish council commented on the contemporary style of the building and its proximity to a listed building and the risk of light pollution. SODC decision is awaited.

<u>Low Hill</u>, Marsh Baldon P17/S3444/HH: An application for replacement windows and door to a conservatory. The parish council has supported this application. <u>Durham Leys Farm</u> P17/S3500/FUL: an application for a 2 bedroomed house to replace a hay barn. The council is considering its response.

Neighbourhood Plan

We have now completed the 7 week consultation period for the draft Neighbourhood Plan. About 100 of you attended the public meeting in the village hall on the 3rd October at which the mood was supportive with keen interest shown on many aspects of the Plan particularly on site selection and social/affordable housing. The views aired and the questions asked were all minuted by the Parish Clerk and, together with the written comments received from 38 individuals, are being carefully evaluated. This evaluation will lead to a revised version of the Plan which we hope to complete for formal submission to SODC by the end of November. This revised version will be posted on the village website.

In the meantime many thanks for your interest and support

Oxford to Cambridge Expressway.

An Expressway action group, EAG, has been set up by Cuddesdon Parish Council and there are in excess of 17 parishes from Radley and the Wittenhams to Wheatley involved with the group.

The aim is to be ready for a campaign to try and influence the choice of route before it becomes set in stone. The National Infrastructure Commission (NIC) is due, we understand, to make a recommendation of a preferred route in its report to government in November. A number of options are being considered and researched by the NIC and Highways England, including a southern or northern option. The road is an important infrastructure development which has government

policy and support behind it, and there will be significant release of land for housing to help finance it. Large numbers of houses are being suggested.

There is concern that there will be no public consultation other than through local councils until the route has been finally determined. If the southern route is recommended the damage that will be done to villages on the south side of the city and to the Green Belt is potentially very considerable.

It is believed that Sandford-on-Thames, the Baldons, Garsington, Horspath and Cuddesdon are the villages most likely to be affected by any route that comes off the A34 south of the city.

Whilst OCC publicly remains neutral about the choice of route they may favour the southern option to take pressure off the A34 (see articles in the Oxford press and other media).

The group aims to provide evidence to counter any southern route proposals and to demonstrate the better option of a northern route up the A34 towards Bicester and beyond.

When a full campaign is required we will be hoping for villagers to support our concerns in letter writing, fundraising and publicity. The council has already written to the NIC, the County Council, SODC and our MP John Howell and we can provide information for anyone willing to write letters and to be involved.

There will of course be a full public enquiry when the government's plans are finally published in 2018 or 2019.

We will keep you up to date via the newsletter, the Baldons website and village emails.

South Oxfordshire Local Plan

SODC is now consulting on the final version of its local plan prior to its submission to the Planning Inspectorate and public enquiry in 2018.

NUNEHAM COURTENAY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Another lively **Nuneham Courtenay Parish Council meeting** took place on 5th September, thanks largely to the contributions of the parishioners present. Councillors Madhvi Saini, John Peters & Jenny Ballam were joined by 10 members of the public.

Parishioners' issues raised

<u>Trees on the Main Road</u> – Although the trees have preservation orders they overshadow the footpath & are a potential risk to property as they now nearly touch the houses in some cases. There are too many leaves making it slippery under foot & difficult to walk. It was agreed Highways Department was responsible for corrective action & PC was urged to chase them urgently.

<u>Traffic Lights & a Crossing for Nuneham Courtenay</u> continues to be a vexing subject. Luckily Jasminder Love was available to update the meeting on the action previously taken, & funding allocated, to introduce a 30mph zone; traffic calming; traffic lights & an essential zebra crossing. Highways Department have visited the village but declared all schemes impractical for various logistical reasons. PC agreed to invite Highways Representatives back to reconsider the options.

Nuneham Courtenay Sports & Playing Fields Association [SPFA] – has been a charity since 1948; is a member of Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association [OPFA] & has been ROSPA approved. Ron Benson has undertaken the grass cutting for 40 years & has a current rough cut in hand. Unfortunately, the uneven surface has meant that the playing fields can be dangerous & should remain closed to ensure that no children are injured. Jasminder Love related how the committee had taken on the task of raising funds to replace the rusted playing fields equipment & interviewed nearly 40 children to understand what their ideal equipment & site layout would be. The Lease to the Playing Fields is now with a local solicitor & it is hoped that this will be available to present to the PC at the next meeting. The Council needs to agree to take over the lease, & legal responsibility, at an annual peppercorn rent &, after adoption, fund raising can begin in earnest. The boundary fences & gates have been fully funded, but £80-£90K is still required to complete the project & SPFA continues to seek further financial donations, in the name of the charity & with the support of the whole community.

A Village Plan helps to establish a community by answering the question "what kind of village do you want to live in?" Money had been received from Oxford Community First to support a community lead plan but unfortunately this project has stalled & now is the time to restart it. Jasminder Love quoted from the Village Plan Committee minutes that there were 63 houses outside Main Road & the views of all villagers in the community are important.

The Village plan concept is different to a Neighbourhood plan, which is important from a Local Government planning perspective, but both concepts can co-exist & supplement each other.

Finance. The NC Bank Account is now active with 3 new signatories authorised & all known outstanding financial commitments were cleared by the end of August. The Financial Accounts for 5 months ended 31st August were presented by the Finance Officer & noted by the Parish Council

New Councillors. Mandy Rigault was co-opted onto the Council. Nominated Madhvi Saini & seconded by Jenny Ballam. Carried unanimously.

Planning Applications – No objections were raised to the planning applications for garage alterations at the Old Post Office or retrospective annex conversion at 31 Nuneham Courtenay.

Any Other Business - <u>Defibrillator –</u> PC to consider options, particularly for outside Village Hall.

New Era For Daytime Support In Oxfordshire

A new system of delivering daytime support services in Oxfordshire came in to operation on 1st October. Eight new centres** will provide support for more than 500 older people or people with a learning disability who have been assessed as having an eligible need and some other people who do not have an assessed need. The changes follow a consultation with service users and their families in late 2016 in which they were given the opportunity to have a wide-ranging input in to how the new service should take shape. Within the council's new £4.5m service there are 1,600 days of support per week (3,200 sessions) being provided across the eight locations. Each centre will have its own fleet of familysize vehicles, some of which will be adapted. These will be used to transport people to and from the centres and will be driven by staff from the Community Support Service. There will be a number of options for meals, including: staff supporting people to eat out at a local café, cooking as part of a small group, paying towards a group meal prepared by others, a simple hot meal prepared by staff, and people bringing in their own pre-prepared meal or light lunch if they wish to.

**The centres are located at Audlett Drive, Abingdon; Neithrop Avenue, Banbury; Launton Road, Bicester; Britwell Road, Didcot; Agward Stone Road, Horspath Driftway, Oxford; High Street, Wallingford; Charlton Village Road, Wantage; and Moorland Road, Witney.

NEW COMMUNITIES FUND

The County Council has agreed to provide £250,000 one-off funding for a Communities Fund for communities to bid into for matched funding schemes or projects to supplement services following the recent changes and reductions, for example community transport schemes.

The fund has been allotted to individual councillors so that each has a sum of £5,000 to award. However if a proposed scheme crosses several local divisions a joint bid supported by multiple Councillors will be eligible. The closing date for bids is 31st December, and bids will be reviewed and decisions made at the next OCC Locality meeting on 19th January 2018.


FREE ELECTRIC BLANKET TESTING OFFERED AS THE WINTER MONTHS APPROACH

SAVE THE FLEUR AS A COMMUNITY PUB IT MUST NOT BE LOST AS A VILLAGE ASSET

We want the Fleur de Lys, Dorchester-on-Thames to be owned by and run for the community. It can be more than just another pub. This historic building is superbly sited to become a community hub for Dorchester. We do not want to see the pub shut or get run down before change of use.

How would it be saved? by the community buying the pub through a Community Benefit Society (CBS). The Fleur has already been registered as an Asset of Community Value. We are in a moratorium period when no sale can be made, which expires on 20th November. This gives us time to prepare a bid. We have a tight timescale. The asking price is £655,000. We need to raise money to buy the freehold, cover acquisition costs, perform necessary refurbishments, recruit a tenant, and retain a contingency.

What next? We need to establish how much the community is willing to invest, and whether there is a willingness in the Dorchester and surrounding villages to contribute sufficient funds to make the project viable.

The more people who are able to pledge a commitment to buying shares, and the greater the community involvement in our project, the greater the chance of success. We are not yet at the stage where we can launch a formal share offer so at present we are asking for Pledge Forms to be completed to help us demonstrate the level of support.

How would the Share Issue work? The value of one share will be £100. We wish to be inclusive so the minimum number of shares per investor is 1(£100), with the maximum per investor is 1000 (£100,000). Each investor will have a single vote no matter their level of investment. The Shares cannot be traded, but may be redeemed by the CBS in full after 3 years if sufficient funds are available. If the CBS has to be liquidated, any surplus has to be given to another charity.

Shares may pay interest but not dividends.

Shareholders must hold their shares for a minimum of three years and during this period no interest will be paid.

This is not just about buying a pub, it's about helping to sustain a community.

Non-binding pledges can be submitted using the attached pledge form, or alternatively you can make pledges online at www. friendsofthefleur.com/pledge, by 5th November 2017. No money changes hands at this stage and your pledge will be treated confidentially.

This pledge does not constitute a commitment

to Invest but we need to have realistic offers to gauge the likelihood of success. More financial information and a formal share offer will be provided in due course. Should you decide to invest, you would do so on the understanding that a proper business case has been put to you, explaining how the pub will be bought and operated, and that you are satisfied with the level of risk involved.


