FROM REVD PAUL CAWTHORNE

During the summer, we came away from the beach for a day at the folk festival in Shrewsbury. There was a vibrancy about the music, children's activities, food and drinks on offer which fits well with the season.

Not everyone is a fan of folk music but I have a deep respect for its role as a carrier of culture across generations, in contrast with our recent dizzying culture shifts which seem to be leading to a loss of historical memory.

Some of the vigour of folk music is shown in the prophetic new songs recently written by Jon Boden addressing contemporary challenges in 'Songs from the flood plain' and in the popularity of Devon folkie Seth Lakeman with mainstream audiences. There has been a revival of interest, with lots of young performers and a complete spread of ages evident at Shrewsbury.

The contrast between this and many of the sad happenings over the summer, with terrorist attacks, refugee crises, flood and drought beleaguering different communities across the globe is stark. Such events could leave us very fearful indeed.

If we allow ourselves to become over-focussed on the threats, fear gains the upper hand and our understanding of human nature becomes impoverished. An antidote to this dynamic was recently shown in a meal held at Abingdon where local leaders of the progressive Muslim community invited people from other faiths to share a meal together, with traditional singing and relaxed opportunity to get to know each other better through table fellowship.

Such affirmative events as music festivals and multi-faith initiatives show ways to feed the spiritual imagination and help us avoid retreating into narrower defensive patterns of life. It is no coincidence that there was a collection for Rohingya refugees at the interfaith meal. Our God is the Lord of time and space, calling us on into an unknown future, but asking us to appreciate the past, to retain what is valuable, to listen and learn, to continue the precarious journey of life in faith.



Public Meeting on 3rd October at the village hall at 7.30 pm

WASTE AND RECYCLING CHANGES

Oxfordshire County Council's for free disposal of three DIY waste items is changing. From 1st October 2017 this changes to a small fixed fee per item of £1.50 for most **non-household or DIY** items. Residents can still deposit **household** waste for free at their local Household Waste Recycling Centre. This change will allow all of the County's Household Waste Recycling Centres to remain open. BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Planning applications

Mallams, Toot Baldon: an application for a replacement house and garage following demolition of the existing property. Planning ref P17/S3077/FUL. The Parish Council is considering its response.

Manor Barn, Toot Baldon: an application for replacement and new conservation roof lights. P17/S2732/LB. The Parish Council has indicated support to SODC. 33 The Green. P17/S2411/FUL. A retrospective application for change of use from agricultural to garden status for a part of the garden. The Parish Council has indicated support to SODC.

Neighbourhood Plan

Every household should have had their copy. Please read it and comment, your view is really very important to the future development of the village. See separate notice of the public meeting on 3rd October.

Oxford to Cambridge Expressway

Many of you will have heard or read in the media of the proposed Oxford and Cambridge Expressway, a new transport link that is being considered by the National Infrastructure Commission to support the developing economies and science technology and innovation between our two university cities.

Whilst some may doubt the need for such a road this is a long term project that has government support but which could have major implications for villages south of Oxford City. The NIC will we understand be making recommendations in the next few months/weeks as to the best route to take from Oxford. A northern route could be via the A34 to Bicester and onwards via Bedford which is more direct and could be more economic, however along with other villages in south Oxfordshire we have become aware that there is a strong possibility that a southern route to be chosen which would have significant implications for development in the Green Belt and for the villages such as ours which sit close to the Oxford City boundary. We also understand that a southern route is likely to be the preferred option of OCC and the city council. A southern route would open up land in the Green Belt not just for the road but for housing and be extremely damaging to the countryside.

Meetings have taken place between representatives of parishes south of Oxford and including the Baldons and a fighting group to campaign against a southern route is already being formed.

The Parish Council has already agreed to write to the Chairman of the National Infrastructure Commission and our MP John Howell and others expressing our belief that the northern route via the A34 and Bicester should be the preferred route with our concerns set out against a southern route option. We aim to keep villagers informed.

Driving on the Green

A clear area of car tracks has again developed on the south side of the Green as cars and other vehicles attempt to avoid the track.

We must remind villagers and other users that driving on the Green is an offence in law and must be discouraged. Maintenance of the track is the responsibility of <u>all</u> householders and <u>business</u> on that side of the green. See below.

Road Closure Notice: 13-17 November

We have been given advance warning of a road closure extending from the A4074 Nuneham Courtenay through Marsh Baldon to near the triangle at Baldon Row. This is to enable contactors for BT to lay cabling.

Diversions will be in place using the B4015 and B480.

There will be access for emergency vehicles and for houses fronting the road works

We will try and get more information from the contractor nearer the time.

Defibrillator

Councillors thanked Sara Saw and Dave Jeffries for all their efforts in getting the new Defibrillator installed in the old Telephone box.

From The Parish Council records

Tracks round the green.

In 1948 the Parish meeting approached the County Council about the creation of a road on the south side of the green. The response from the county was that this was not possible and would have to be private initiative and proposed that the 'frontagers' to the green agree amongst themselves to have a track which should be 16 ft. wide and be funded and maintained by themselves.

Later record shows that in 1961 the parish meeting obtained the agreement of The Queen College for an extension of the earlier track from a point near no 37 on the south east side of the Green towards Blenheim corner. Again to be funded and maintained locally. In 1963 a sub-committee of villagers was created to make progress on this latter track

It would be very helpful today if villagers again formed a small committee to manage the fundraising and regular maintenance required on the whole length of the track.

War time records

There is little in either Parish record book of discussion about the impact of either WW1 or WW2. However in Marsh Baldon minute book there is reference in 1942 to the army proposing to create, in an inconspicuous place on the Green, a secret store of explosives for the use if necessary by the Home Guard!!


